Scripture Reading: Psalm 138

It takes a disciplined and special kind of person to enter a monastery or a convent. Not everyone is suited for the contemplative life. This is why most religious orders require that novices stay with the order for a significant time before taking vows. Mother Superior wants the novice to be absolutely clear about what she is getting into.

One of the fundamental requirements of some orders is silence. Maybe the following story happened; maybe it didn't. But in a certain monastery of a certain order, it was required of the monks that silence must always be maintained. Opportunities to speak were scheduled *once every two years*, at which time they were allowed to speak only two words. Can you imagine?!

One young initiate who had completed his first two years of training was invited by his superior to make his first two-word presentation. "Food terrible," he said. Oh dear! But life in the monastery went on.

Two years later, the same invitation was once again extended. The young man used the opportunity to grumble, "Bed lumpy."

Arriving at his superior's office two years later, he announced, "I quit."

The abbot looked at this young monk and said, "You know, I am not at all surprised. All you've done since you arrived is complain, complain, complain."

This story might be exaggerated. But the point is well-taken. To complain is to waste one's energy. Complainers position themselves as victims, when, with a proper attitude and some creative responses, they could be victors.

The Israelites were notorious complainers as they journeyed to the Promised Land. They drove Moses and the Lord to distraction. And nary a one of them, save Joshua and Caleb, reached their objective.

Someone said that humans invented language to satisfy their deep need to complain. But with God's help, we can stop complaining and get to work and change what can be changed, and ask God for patience to endure what cannot be changed.
